

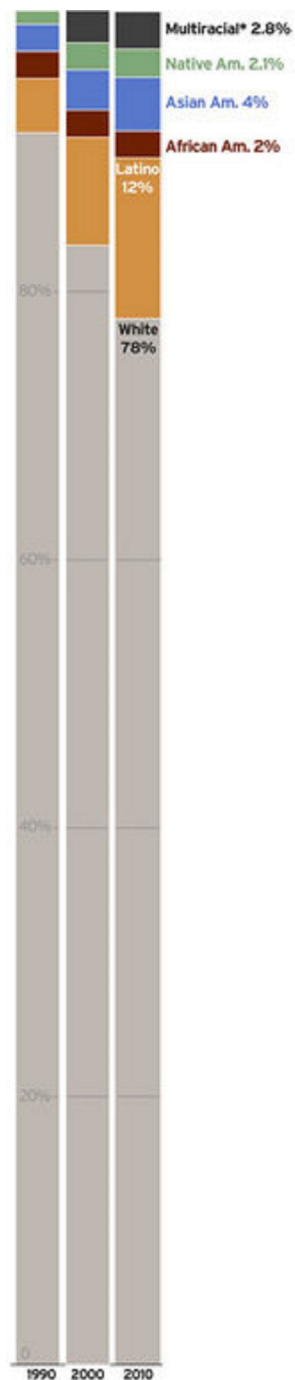


More interesting data from Oregon's 2010 census

Top-20 city with most growth: Redmond, which grew 94.5% to 26,215 residents

Metro-area city with most growth: Hillsboro, 30.5% to 91,611

County with most growth: Deschutes, up 37% to 157,733

County that shrank the most: Sherman, down 8% to 1,765

Whitest county: Wallowa, with just over 95% of 7,008 residents listed as white

Least-white county: Jefferson (home to the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs), with 62% of 21,720 residents listed as white.

Whitest cities*: Baker City, 92% white; Sweet Home 91%; Florence 89%; in the metro area, West Linn, 88%; Oregon City and Lake Oswego 87%.

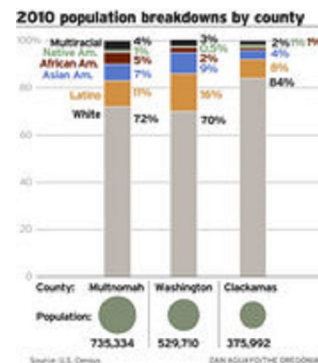
Least-white cities*: Woodburn is 59% Latino, 38% white; Cornelius is 50% Latino, 44% white

African American shift: 55% of black Oregonians inside Portland city limits, down from 65% in 2000

County with highest percentage of Latinos: Malheur, 32% of 31,313 residents

County with highest percentage of Asians: Washington, 9% of 529,710 residents

Metro-area cities with little population change: Gladstone gained 0.5% to 11,497 residents, Milwaukie lost 1% to 20,291, Vernonia lost 3.5% to 2,151, and Lake Oswego gained 4% to 36,619.
